





## Reflections on the DFRC Blue-Gold experience



### An Interview with DFRC Blue-Gold Alumnus Dr. Mehmet Oz

*In 1978, Dr. Mehmet Oz was selected to represent Tower Hill in the 23<sup>rd</sup> Annual DFRC Blue-Gold All★Star Football Game. He contacted DFRC this year in an effort to reconnect with his Buddy, John Madanat. Below Dr. Oz provides us with his reflections about his experience with John and the Game.*

◆ **Were you aware of the DFRC Blue-Gold Game prior to your selection and the fact that it was more than an all-star game?**

It was a great honor to be selected for the game, but I knew little else about the DFRC charitable endeavors, which is where its soul is reflected.

◆ **What were your feelings when you were chosen for the game?**

I was thrilled as an athlete, and honored as a human being to be allowed to interface with so many wonderful people.

◆ **We believe that the added elements of education and sensitivity training provided in today's Hand-in-Hand Program have made the experience very different from what it was in 1978. Can you tell us a little bit about the Hand-in-Hand program when you were part of it?**

The Hand-in-Hand program was very informal and focused on allowing me to take John on day trips. We would swim, play sports, see events, and drive around Wilmington so both he and I could see a life from a different perspective. We were earnestly curious about each other. I also got to meet John's family and see what joy he brought to their lives, and how they were able to cope with the challenges that he encountered.

◆ **Do you have any exceptional memories about camp? It sounds like it was a hot two weeks in August.**

The three practices per day ensured that everyone slept well at night. I loved playing with rivals from high school, including Tom Bartoshevsky from A.I. duPont. We became stronger as a team, which culminated in a strange morning

practice halfway through where everyone (coaches included) went into a frenzied pre-game-like state and started cheering and chanting as we hit the blocking dummies. It was a turning point and we ultimately won the game the following weekend.

◆ **Any reflections on the game itself?**

I loved playing in the stadium with high quality athletes who were great competitors. The game was clean and powerful and prepared me superbly for my own pre-season in college, only a week away.

◆ **What made you reconnect with DFRC?**

I was watching a Special Olympics piece and missed John and wanted to see him again. I am close friends with the Shriver family (mother started Special Olympics and Tim runs the organization) and have always respected their philosophy that we are judged on how we take care of the weakest among us. Children with intellectual disabilities will not be "cured" of their condition, so our resolve to continue to play a role in making our society supportive of their desire to live maximally fulfilling lives is tested. We learn so much from kids like John that any investment we make is returned with great benefits.

◆ **Were you aware of DFRC's other endeavors and programs?**

Not as much as I should have been but it plays an important role in bringing together the best players in Delaware; celebrating kids with learning disabilities is well known even outside of Delaware.

◆ **Any advice to current DFRC Blue-Gold All★Star players?**

Focus on the lives you touch during the experience - other players, coaches, families, and especially the kids.

◆ **Do you have any feelings on why DFRC should continue?**

For the same reason the Special Olympics is so critical to our societal health. We focus for a day on kids who need us; and we need them also.

## A COACH'S REFLECTION

*In 2008, as an assistant with the Gold squad, current Gold Head Coach Fred Johnson (Lake Forest) witnessed firsthand the impact DFRC has on the participants of the DFRC Blue-Gold game. The 2011 game has added meaning for him since his daughter, Reily, is a first-year Buddy in the DFRC Blue-Gold Hand-in-Hand Program. We asked Coach Johnson to share some thoughts on what it's like to be the parent of a child with an intellectual disability, and how it has changed him as a coach.*

From the days of sleeping with my middle school football helmet at night as a twelve year old kid to working as an assistant coach my freshman year of college under my own high school football coaches; football was always a passion of mine. So in the summer of 2006, when I was chosen to become head coach to my alma mater, Lake Forest High School, I was full of excitement and anticipation of living my dream. In addition, my wife was expecting our third child and I remember thinking that all my dreams had come true that year. Little did I know what this dream entailed, the journey it would take me through, and how I would evolve along the way...

My dream of being a head football coach and the reality of it were vastly different as I struggled to get my athletes to buy into my football program built on self-discipline, respect, commitment, and hard work. And the excitement of expectations for my newborn baby slowly waned as I secretly struggled to understand and accept that my daughter Reily was not progressing as a typical baby should.

We began to realize that Reily was introducing our family to a "new world" - one that I always knew existed but was relieved to never have to live in - that is, until she was born. Like many others, I thought that those who lived in this world were burdened with a lifetime of disappointment, grief, and helplessness. As a result, I had an underlying sense of pity for them. However, much to my surprise, Reily showed us that this "world" is truly made of strength, perseverance, joy, and recognition of life's tremendous gifts, both big and small.

Reily, now 4 years old, has been classified as both visually and hearing impaired with cerebral palsy, global developmental delays, and seizure disorder. She does not walk, talk, or even sit independently – but she has eyes and a smile that will melt even the toughest lineman's heart. She gets joy out of cuddling with her big brother and sister, gets excitement from a spinning toy she's had since she was a

month old, and belly laughs at the sound of a snorting dog or crinkling paper.

Reily has taught us to celebrate the moments that most take for granted. Like the time she held eye contact with my wife for over 10 seconds, bringing tears to my wife's eyes. And the first time Reily sat for over a minute without toppling over, which we were sure to catch on camera and share with all who love her. Reily has taught us to truly appreciate the complexity and wonders of the human body and to revel in the beauty of her excitement and joy in the things we typically overlook.

And the lessons that Reily has taught do not just apply to home but, for me, on the field as well. She has taught me patience and the understanding that not everyone thinks or learns the way I do and, as a result, to recognize the unique needs of my athletes. She has given me more drive to work harder, demand more, and push my players because they can't always recognize or appreciate their own personal gifts and talents. She's taught me endurance and determination that a series of small successes can result in big accomplishments although it may just take a little more time than anticipated.

Without these life lessons that Reily has taught me, I'm not sure I would've made it past my first year as head coach when the season was cut short or even past the second when we barely had enough players to field a team. She has been my inspiration to keep going everyday and not to give up.

I am so proud to be a part of this year's DFRC Blue-Gold All★Star Football Game and witnessing how understanding, compassion, and the appreciation of life's little gifts will present themselves to all the Blue-Gold participants as a result of the lessons their Buddies will teach them. Being invited to be part of this special "world" is an honor - one that I am so lucky to have received from my little girl Reily but also to share and witness with the participants in this year's DFRC Blue-Gold events.

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## BENEFICIARY SPOTLIGHT

### DSA of Delaware



For over 30 years, the Down Syndrome Association of Delaware (DSA of Delaware) has provided support and resources to family, friends, community members and professionals who touch the lives of individuals with Down Syndrome across the state of Delaware and the surrounding area.

Some of these programs include: New Parent Outreach, the Lending Library, play dates, family dances, holiday events, teen and adult dances, bingo and karaoke. In addition, DSA

of Delaware recognizes the importance of educating teachers and healthcare professionals through programs such as monthly Parent Education Meetings, sponsorship of Grand Rounds speakers at area hospitals, and support and promotion of the Down syndrome Clinic at AI duPont Hospital. With the backing of its members and benefactors, like DFRC, the DSA of Delaware is able to provide these supports and

resources. The DSA of Delaware attributes a number of their successful programs to the initial and continued support of DFRC.

The DSA of Delaware is most commonly known for the annual Buddy Walk - an awareness walk promoting the understanding, inclusion and acceptance of people with Down syndrome. In 2004, with an initial DFRC grant of \$2,900 in seed money, the DSA of Delaware held the first walk with 360 walkers raising \$30,000. Since then, the walk has grown and in 2010 had over 1600 walkers and raised \$98,000. Since 2007, the DSA of Delaware has partnered with DFRC to host the Blue-Gold Hand-in-Hand Picnic as part of the Buddy Walk celebration.

The DSA of Delaware scholarship program, which began as a DFRC funded "Exercise for Life" grant, is primarily funded from the Buddy Walk proceeds and has evolved into an enhanced scholarship program providing funding for recreation and art programs for members of all ages, as well as conferences and seminars for parents and self-advocates.

DFRC provided seed money to help fund a Professional Education Seminar in 2008. With the partnership of Easter Seals of Delaware, the DSA of Delaware now hosts annual professional education seminars. These seminars offer informative sessions focused on topics that directly affect individuals with Down syndrome and other disabilities, are presented by experts in the area of focus, and provide continuing education credits to participants.

Project Literacy, a new program partially underwritten by DFRC, will package resource materials within specific educational groups for parents and professionals attending the Buddy Walk to take back to their schools and use in their homes. The DSA of Delaware plans to use the success of the Buddy Walk, with its built in audience of parents, supporters and professionals from all three Delaware counties, as a vehicle to move Project Literacy into the hands of those with the greatest need.

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
